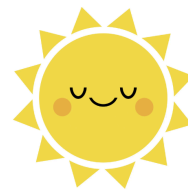




Kindergarten Summer Work 2024



Daily reading with your child is important! Please have your child complete whatever amount (if any) from the suggestions below you feel is appropriate. There are no expectations for work to be turned in next school year.

Math:

- [Counting Collections](#) activities, this can be done multiple times and with different collections of items!
- Practice counting, addition and subtraction with household items with [House Math](#).
- Play games using dice. You can double one die for moves in the game, add one die to 10, or even subtract one die from 10 for a move. Be creative and keep it fun. We play cooperative games where we play to win together. There are no losers!
- Play the game you played during our showcase. Use any material that can be described and put a barrier between you to obstruct the line of sight. See how close you can come to making one another's designs!

- [DreamBox](#) is available all summer, log-in information will be provided.

DreamBox is an online math program that aligns with our Context For Learning Math Program. Students use this supplemental program in elementary school on their school iPads. DreamBox is completely optional in Kindergarten and if you are a low-tech or no tech family you can disregard this.

Writing:

- In notebook either free write, or respond to a [writing prompt](#).
- Write a letter to a relative, Dolores, Jenny, or anyone and drop it in the mail.
- Write a "how to" book. Include tips and tricks, warnings and sequencing words such as first, next, then, last.
- Write a true story. Include details that will make it interesting for the reader.
- Write a letter or make a sign to persuade people to make something better for the community.

Reading:

- Read picture books to your child daily.
- Read a chapter book (i.e. Frog and Toad or longer if your child is interested) to your child over the course of several days. Ask them to review what happened on the previous reading before starting the new chapter.
- After reading (independently or with an adult) have a book discussion using our ["Book Club Discussion Cards"](#)
- Have your child read books and fill out the [Summer Reading Bingo Card](#). If they get BINGO, keep going to see if they can fill in the full card!
